







CROSSING SAFETY











- 1. Follow signs and signals.
- Walk on sidewalks whenever they are available and barrierfree.
- If there is no sidewalk, or if a sidewalk is inaccessible, walk facing traffic and as far from traffic as possible.
- Always keep alert; don't be distracted by electronic devices that take your eyes (and ears) off the road.
- Whenever possible, cross streets at crosswalks or intersections, look for cars in all directions, including those turning left or right.
- If a crosswalk or well-lit area is not accessible, please monitor for a long, clear opening in traffic before crossing the street.
- Drinking and drugs can impair your judgment; consume responsibly.



- Get acquainted with traffic laws; bicyclists must follow the same rules as motorists
- You may ride two abreast if you are not impeding the normal flow of traffic or when you are riding on a designated bikeway; otherwise ride single file.
- Remain alert, keep your head up and look around; watch for opening car doors and other hazards.
- Use hand signals when turning and use extra care at intersections.
- A horn or bell, a rear-view mirror, reflectors and a bright headlight also are recommended.
- 6. Never hitch onto cars.
- Before entering traffic, stop and look left, right, left again and over your shoulder.



DRIVING SAFETY

- Look out for pedestrians everywhere, always.
- Use extra caution when driving in hard-to-see conditions such as nighttime or bad weather.
- 3. Stop for pedestrians in crosswalks and stop well back from the crosswalk to give other vehicles an opportunity to see the crossing pedestrians so they can stop too.
- 4. Never pass vehicles stopped at a crosswalk - there may be people crossing that you can't see.
- Never drive under the influence of alcohol and/or drugs.
- Follow slower speed limits in school zones and in neighborhoods where children are present.
- Be extra cautious and double check surroundings when backing up.







Network Mileage


Since adoption of the Houston Bike Plan, Houston's high-comfort network has increased by 136 miles (50%)

Projected Expansion

At its current rate, Houston's bicycle network is projected to grow to **500 miles** by **2026**



- Current Growth: 26 mi/year
- Projected Mileage in 2037: 796

To reach the Houston Bike Plan's Long-Term Vision (1,789 mi) by 2037, the network needs to grow by **92 mi/year.**
